About Augusta



Augusta's Beginnings

Long before Europeans came up the Kennebec River to the "head of the tide," Algonquianspeaking Indians, considered Wabanaki or "People of the Dawn," were already here. As early as1607, the area was explored by English settlers from the short-lived Sagadahoc or Popham Colony at the river's mouth.

Representatives of Plymouth Colony were the first English to actually live here. In 1625, on a river expedition to find a place to trade agricultural products for Indian furs, Plymouth pilgrims chose the east shore for their "House at Kennebeck." The post, probably built in 1628, was operated by the original traders and, later, by Plymouth Company with varying degrees of success, until it was abandoned some time between 1669 and 1676.

There were French as well as English influences here in the 17th and 18th centuries. In 1646, a Jesuit priest, Gabriel Dreuillettes, visited "an English settlement named Kinibeki." and established a mission nearby for the Kennebec natives. It was then that the term "Cushnoc,"(*"Coussinoc" or "Kouissnoc"*) first appeared in reference to the Plymouth trading post.

After years of conflict involving the French, Indians, and English and several decades during which Kennebec settlements were deserted, the Kennebec Proprietors, successors to the Plymouth Company, erected Fort Western near the Cushnoc site. Located below the falls at the head of navigation, the fort was intended as a supply depot for Fort Halifax , 17 miles upriver. The proprietors also initiated efforts to settle the region. When military staffing was no longer needed, Captain James Howard, who had commanded the fort, stayed on as the first permanent settler. The fort's main building served as a residence and a store.

The village called "the Fort" was the upriver part of the town incorporated as Hallowell in 1771. In February, 1796, the Fort residents petitioned the Massachusetts Legislature for permission to build the first Kennebec bridge. Although "the Hook," as the lower Hallowell village was called, wanted the bridge on its shore, the Fort request was granted. The following February, in 1797, the legislature approved separation of the Fort from Hallowell. Incorporated first as Harrington, the new town changed its name to Augusta on June 9, 1797.

In 1799, Augusta became the shire town of the newly formed Kennebec County. In 1827, the town was designated the capital of Maine, which had entered the union in 1820 as the 23rd state. The Maine Legislature met here for the first time in January, 1832. Augusta was chartered as a city in 1849.

In addition to its governmental roles, Augusta has been, through the years, a frontier trading place, an inland shipping port, a center for publishing and manufacturing, and, now, post-secondary education. (*reprinted from the City of Augusta web site*)

Location, Geography and Climate

Augusta is located in the heart of Central Maine. Just 3.5 hours north of Boston, Augusta is also ideally positioned between Maine's two largest cities, Portland (one hour to the south) and Bangor (one hour to the north). The fact that 70% of Maine's population (900,000 people) can reach the city in less than two hour's drive attests to Augusta's convenient and central location.

Most major state roads and highways converge in Augusta. Direct access to the Maine Turnpike and Interstate 95 is ideal for north-south travel, and major state roads make Augusta a gateway to eastern and western Maine.

Augusta rises in a series of terraces and sharp inclines east and west of the bisecting Kennebec River. Summers are pleasant; though winters have a reputation for harshness, they are not actually as severe as those experienced in places of corresponding latitude. Freezing temperatures at night are common in October and November, continuing to mid-to-late April. Precipitation is well distributed throughout the year.

Health Care

Recreation

Over 5,000 kids and adults enjoy the more than 50 programs offered by **the city's bureau of recreation**, as well as several tournaments, clinics, concerts, field trips, playground activities and senior excursions offered throughout the year. Municipal recreation facilities include tennis and basketball courts, swimming pools, softball/baseball fields, winter skating rinks, and river boat launches. Passive recreational opportunities are available thanks to the efforts of **the city's parks bureau**, which cares for 15 neighborhood parks and public grounds throughout the city. The city has two parks which are situated ideally **on the banks of the Kennebec River**, where you can enjoy a rejuvenated river that's as clean and populated with wildlife as it was a hundred years ago. **Bicentennial Nature Park** is the newest fixture in the city's parks system. Augusta residents and their guests enjoy swimming, picnicking and hiking alongside scenic Three Cornered Pond on the city's east side. The park is open from Memorial Day to late October. Heritage and Culture

Old Fort Western, New England's oldest surviving wooden fort, was built in 1754 by the Proprieters of the Kennebec Purchase and is now designated as a National Historic Landmark. Located on the banks of the Kennebec River, Old Fort Western offers year-round programming including guided tours, demonstrations, reenactments, apprenticeships and school and group tours. The Kennebec Historical Society preserves, protects and interprets artifacts relating to the rich history of Maine's Capital City and the rest of Kennebec County. The Society presents public programs and maintains a collection of public documents, reference books, newspapers, maps and photographs. The State House, the Governor's Mansion, and Capitol Park represent the center of Augusta's Capital District, located on the western banks of the Kennebec River. The Bullfinch-designed State House, one of Maine's architectural treasures, was built in 1829 using granite quarried from nearby Hallowell (for tours call 207-287-2301). The Blaine House, the official residence of Maine's governors since 1919, is open for public tours (call 207-282-2121). Capitol Park is the earliest known, consciously-designed public ground in Maine, and today is home to passive recreation areas and important landmarks like the Maine Vietnam Veterans Memorial.
