A-131 ORDERED, That Boucher Avenue be accepted as a City Street, description of this street as follows:

Beginning in the southerly line of North Belfast Road, one hundred and eight and seventy hundreds (108.70) feet westerly of the easterly line of Wilfred Boucher's land, as purchased from Purinton Bros. Company and formerly known as the Brick Yard; thence South 26 degrees 10 minutes West, two hundred and fifty (250) feet; thence northwesterly at right angles, forty (40) feet; thence at right angles and parallel to the first described course i.e., North 26 degrees 10 minutes East to the southerly line of the North Belfast Road; thence by the southerly line of North Belfast Road to the point of beginning.

Meaning to describe a street forty feet (40') wide and extending southwestly over land of said Wilfred Boucher approximately two hundred and fifty (250') feet.

That I, Wilfred Boucher of Augusta, in the County of Kennebec and State of Maine

in consideration of one dollar and other valuable consideration paid by the City of Augusta, a body corporate and politic situated in said Augusta the receipt whereof I do hereby acknowledge, do hereby give, grant, bargain, sell and convey unto the said City of Augusta, its successors

and assigns forever, a certain lot or parcel of land situated on the east side of the Kennebec River in the City of Augusta and bounded and described as follows:

Beginning in the southerly line of North Belfast Road, one hundred and eight and seventy hundredths (108.70) feet westerly of the easterly line of Wilfred Boucher's land, as purchased from Purinton Brothers Company, and formerly known as the Brickyard; thence South 26 degrees 10 minutes West, two hundred and fifty (250) feet; thence northwesterly at right angles and

parallel to the first described line, i.e., North 26 degrees 10 minutes East to the southerly line of the North Belfast Road; thence, by the southerly line of the North Belfast Road to the point of beginning.

Meaning to describe a street forty (40) feet wide and extending southwesterly over land of said Wilfred Boucher approximately two hundred fifty (250) feet. For a more particular description see Plan of Boucher Avenue made by the City of Augusta.
