STATE OF MAINE

Kennebec, SS

To James Black one of the Constables of the Town of Augusta, within said County:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to warn the freeholders and other inhabitants of the said Town of Augusta, qualified to vote in Town affairs to meet and assemble at the Town House on Monday the twelfth day of March instant at ten of the clock in the forenoon then and there to act on the following article, viz:

A street commencing on Arsenal Street and running easterly to the County Road leading to Hallowell.

VOTED

At an adjournment of the Annual Meeting of the Inhabitants of the Town of Augusta, qualified to vote in Town affairs, held at the Town House in said Augusta on Monday the second day of April A.D. 1838 at ten o'clock in the forenoon.

VOTED, To accept a street on the east side of Kennebec River as the same is laid out by the Selectmen and described in the petition for said street and in the report of the laying out of the same as follows, viz: The undersigned, petitioners, of the Town of Augusta, are desirous of having a road laid out on the east side of Kennebec River in Augusta, commencing on the east side of Arsenal Street at Captain Patterson's barn and running east on the line dividing the land owned by Capt. Patterson, William K. Weston, William Bibber, John Barnett, William

P. Basford and William Burgess on the one side; and Colonel Redington and the heirs of the Stone Estate, on the other side, to the old County Road, being about sixty rods. The petitioners being of the opinion that such road would convene the public, pray the selectmen to proceed to layout such road forthwith at least fifty feet wide taking as much land on one side of said dividing line as from the other.

The selectmen having laid out the road as requested within, and state that the damages claimed by those owning land through which it passes is seven hundred and seventy-five dollars, viz: Samuel Patterson, five hundred dollars: William Burgess seventy-five dollars and William A. Brooks, Administrator upon the estate of Daniel Stone two hundred dollars. All persons interested were notified and no other persons claimed any damages. The damage to Samuel Patterson is undoubtedly considerable, but probably not so much as he claimed. Burgess will suffer as much as seventy-five dollars in their opinion, but the estate of Daniel Stone will suffer very little if any damage.

ARTICLE 6

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen of the Town of Augusta

The undersigned petitioners of the Town of Augusta are desirous of having a road laid out on the east side of the Kennebec River in Augusta. Commencing on the east side of Arsenal Street at Capt. Patterson's barn, and running east on the line dividing the land owned by Capt. Patterson, William K. Weston, William Bibber, John Barnett, William P. Basford and William Burgess on the one side; and Col. Redington and the heirs of the Stone Estate, on the other side, to the old County Road, being about fifty rods, your petitioners being of the opinion that such road would convene the public, pray your honors to proceed to layout such

road forthwith at least fifty feet wide taking as much land on one side of said dividing line as from the other.

The selectmen having laid out the road as requested within, state that the damages claimed by those owning land through which it passes is seven hundred and seventy dollars, viz: Samuel Patterson, five hundred dollars; William Burgess seventy-five dollars and William A. Brooks, Administrator upon the estate of Daniel Stone two hundred dollars; all persons interested were notified and no other persons claimed any damages. The damage to Samuel Patterson is undoubtedly considerable, but probably not so much as he claims, Burgess will suffer as much as seventy-five dollars in their opinion, but the estate of Daniel Stone will suffer very little if any damage.
