March 11, 1839

VOTED

At the Annual Meeting of the Inhabitants of the Town of Augusta, qualified to vote in Town affairs, legally called and notified, held at the Town House on Monday the eleventh day of March A.D. 1839; and by adjournment on the first day of April 1839.

To the Selectmen of the Town of Augusta

The undersigned Inhabitants of said Town respectfully represent that we live about a half a mile from any Town or County road, and would therefore request you to layout a road from the County road by our dwellings to the town line for our convenience, and in the opinion of the petitioners said road would also accommodate the Public.

Joseph Lamson

The undersigned have this day laid out a Road on the within petition as follows:

Commencing at a water course or culvert in the Belfast Road near the House of Charles Clark; thence running South 66 degrees East 187 rods to a log fence between Joseph and John Lamson's land, said road to be four rods wide and to lay south of said line.

The expense of making said Road would be about \$300, and will accommodate no other persons except the petitioners, or those who have business with them.

April 1, 1839

**ARTICLE 6**

At a special meeting of the Inhabitants of the Town of Augusta legally called and notified. Held at Town House on the first day of April A.D., 1839.

VOTED, To accept a road on the east side of the Kennebec River, agreeably to the report of the Selectmen, of the laying out of the same, which report is as follows, viz:

The undersigned have examined the road called the Lamson Road, agreeably to a vote of the Town at their last annual meeting, and have determined that it is inexpedient to make a road where it was then located, and they have laid out a road at the request of Joseph and John Lamson near the same place which they recommend to take the place of the Lamson Road as accepted last spring, as follows, viz:

Commencing at a pine tree east of the meadow; thence running North 45 degrees West twenty-five rods to a white birch tree west of the meadow, which is spotted; thence North 24 degrees West twenty-seven rods to a stake and stone; thence North 63 degrees West twenty-one rods to a rock maple tree, which is spotted; thence on the same course about two rods to the travel of the Belfast Road. Said road to be southerly and westerly of said line, and four rods wide.

ARTICLE 16, To the Selectmen of Augusta

I request you to layout a road from the Lamson Road, (so-called,) through to my land, and from; thence to the Windsor line.

John Lamson

February 22, 1842, Agreeably to the within petition. We the undersigned have this day laid out the following road.

Commencing at a pine stump, east side of the meadow; thence South 67 degrees East direction 82 rods to a stake near John Lamson corn barn; thence South 55 degrees East direction 105 rods to the Windsor line. Said road to be three rods wide and laying south of said line. Damages claimed by Joseph Lamson is \$30 if goes through to Windsor. If stopped at his east line say 74 rods from the Meadow he claims \$50.

The parties were all notified according to Law.

VOTED, To accept a portion of the road on the east side of Kennebec River located by the Selectmen on the petition of John Lamson, upon the condition that the damages by reason of the same shall not exceed the sum of twelve dollars, as follows, to wit:

Commencing at a pine stump in the east side of the meadow; thence South 67 degrees East seventy-four rods to land of John Lamson, said road to be three rods wide and lying south of said line.

Greetings.

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to warn the freeholders and other inhabitants of the said Town of Augusta, qualified to vote in Town affairs, to meet and assemble at the Town House on Monday the eleventh day of March instant at ten of the clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, viz:

ARTICLE 14 VOTED, To see if the Town will accept of of the following roads and streets as laid out by the Selectmen, to wit:

#4. A road commencing at a culvert in the Belfast Road near the house of Charles Clark and running South 66 degrees East 187 rods to a fence between Joseph and John Lamson's land.

At a legal annual meeting of the inhabitants of the Town of Augusta, qualified to vote in Town affairs, holden at the Town House in said Augusta on Monday the eleventh day of March Anno Domini 1839.

VOTED, That so much of this article as relates to the 4th or Lamson Road described therein - be referred to the Selectmen and that they be and hereby are authorized to cause said road to be made agreeably to their report of the laying out of the same if they should deem it expedient so to do.

To James Black one of the Constables of the Town of Augusta within said County.

Greetings.

In the name of the State of Maine, You are hereby required to warn the freeholders and other inhabitants of the said Town of Augusta, qualified to vote in Town affairs, to meet and assemble

at the Town House on Monday the ninth day of March next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, viz:

ARTICLE 6<sup>th</sup>, To see if the Town will accept of the following roads as laid out by the Selectmen - to wit - a road commencing at a pine tree east of the meadow on land of Joseph or John Lamson's; thence running northerly and westerly to the Belfast Road.

At an adjournment of the Annual Meeting of the Inhabitants of the Town of Augusta, qualified to vote in Town affairs, held at the Town House in said Augusta on Monday the twenty third day of March A.D. 1840 at ten o'clock in the morning.

VOTED, To accept a road on the east side of Kennebec River, as the same is laid out by the Selectmen and described in their report of the laying out of the same as follows, viz: The undersigned have examined the road called the Lamson Road agreeably to a vote of the Town at their last annual meeting, and have determined that it is inexpedient to make a road where it was then located and they have laid out a road at the request of Joseph & John Lamson, near the same place which they recommend to take the place of the Lamson Road as accepted last Spring - as follows, viz: Commencing at a pine tree east of the meadow; thence running North 45 degrees West 25 rods, to a white birch tree west of the meadow which is spotted, thence North 24 degrees West 27 rods to a stake and stone; thence North 63 degrees West 21 rods to a rock maple tree which is spotted; thence on the same course about 2 rods to the travel of the Belfast Road, said road to be southerly and westerly of said line and four rods wide.
