To James Black one of the Constables of the Town of Augusta, within said County.

Greeting.

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to warn the freeholders and other inhabitants of the said Town of Augusta, qualified to vote in Town affairs, to meet and assemble at the Town House on Monday the twenty-fifth day of March instant, at ten of the clock in the forenoon then and there to act on the following articles, viz:

ARTICLE 7, To determine if the Town will accept of such roads as have been laid out by the Selectmen.

VOTED

At an adjournment of the Annual Meeting of the inhabitants of the Town of Augusta, qualified to vote, in town affairs held in the town house in said Augusta on Monday the 8th day of April A.D. 1833 at 9 o'clock a.m.

ARTICLE 7 VOTED, To accept of the street or town way laid out by the Selectmen on the east side of the river, reported by them, and described as follows, viz. Beginning at a white oak tree standing on the south side of the County Road leading by the Unitarian Meeting House, and Daniel Stone's dwelling house; thence running South sixteen and and a half degrees West, sixty-three rods to the south line of Daniel Stone's land; thence South seventeen degrees West, thirty-eight rods to a stake and stones on the north line of the street north of John H. Hartwell's dwelling house. Said stake and stones being thirty-four rods westerly of the County Road aforesaid, said street to be three rods wide and laid out on the east side of said line and courses. Seasonable notice was given to all persons interested in the land over which the aforesaid street was laid, who waived all claim to damages, and none were awarded to any person.

Adjourned accordingly,

READ AND PASSED

At the annual meeting of the Inhabitants of The Town of Augusta, qualified to vote in town affairs, legally called and notified, held at the Town House on Monday, March 25th, 1833 at 10 o'clock a.m. and by adjournment on the 8th day of April then next at 9 a.m.

ARTICLE 7 VOTED, To accept a street laid out by the Selectmen on the east side of the Kennebec River, reported and described by them as follows, to wit:

Beginning at a white oak tree standing on the south side of the County Road leading by the Unitarian Meeting House and Daniel Stone's dwelling house; thence running South sixteen and a half degrees West sixty-three rods, to the south line of Daniel Stone's land; thence South seventeen degrees West thirty-eight rods to a stake and stones, on the north line of the street north of John H. Hartwell's dwelling house, said stake and stones being thirty-four rods westerly of the County Road aforesaid, said street to be three rods wide, and laid out on the east side of said line and courses. The undersigned gave reasonable notice to all persons interested in the land over which the aforesaid streets were laid out and who waived all claim to damages, and none were awarded by us to any person.
