VOTED

ARTICLE 22 VOTED, To accept a road on the west side of Kennebec River as laid out and reported by the Selectmen, provided the road is made without expense to the Town and that the damages claimed by Bemsley Caldwell shall not exceed the sum of five dollars. To wit: Commencing at the north east corner of land of Bemsley Caldwell as now fenced on the Sanford Road; thence running North 64 ½ degrees West 86 rods to a stake and stones opposite the dwelling house of Widow Rhoda Cottle; the line thus run to be the southerly line of said road which is to be four rods wide. Notice was duly given to all persons interested.

At the annual meeting of the Inhabitants of Augusta qualified to vote in Town affairs holden at the Town House in said Augusta, according to notice duly and legally given, on Monday the first day of March and by adjournment March 22, 1847.

ARTICLE 22 Voted, To the Selectmen of Augusta

Gentlemen

The undersigned request you to open the road leading from the Sanford Road to the house on the Rhoda Cottle place, where it was formerly travelled.

September 28th 1846

Signed Charles Cottle and three others

Beginning at the northern termination of the road leading from Col. Charles Savage to the house of Samuel G. Burns, and at a stake on the east line of said road; thence Northerly 36 rods to a stake on the east side of a well east of and opposite said Burns' house; thence North 13 degrees 30 minutes East 73 rods to a stake; thence North 27 rods to a stake on the brow of the hill; thence North 7 degrees 30 minutes East 9 rods to the south line of Albert Smith's land at a stake; thence same course 74 rods across said Smith's land, to a stake on the south line of the Sanford Road, so-called. The road to be three rods wide and west of the lines and bounds.

There is no damage claimed by any person except by Mr. Smith to whom your Committee award the sum of forty dollars.
