

Beginning at a stone bound on the west side of Bangor Street one hundred feet at right angles south from L. Robinson's land on which his house stands and as his fence is built, said street to be forty feet wide and south of the above lines; thence on the south line of the tract of land and on the north line of the lot now occupied by William Woart, at a stone bound on a line coinciding with the east line of E. K. Robinson's land as now fenced; thence North 26 East, eight hundred and eighty-three feet to the brow of the ravine to a stone bound set-up, said street to be forty feet wide and east of the above line.

VOTED

To the Honorable, the Mayor, Aldermen and Common Council of the City of Augusta:

The undersigned inhabitants of Augusta, respectfully represent that the public convenience, and wants require that a street be laid out and constructed, beginning at the termination of the street, next north of Myrtle Street, on the east side of the river, running westerly from Bangor Road,

said new street to continue the same westerly course about thirteen rods, till it connects with Willow Street. And your petitioners as in duty bound, will ever pray.

The Committee on New Streets herewith report, that they have this day, as directed by the City Council, laid out a street as requested by E. K. Robinson and others as follows:

Commencing at a point in the west line of the street leading northerly by E. K. Robinson's dwelling house opposite and in range with the north line of the street running westerly from Bangor Street towards Kennebec River, north of the Cony Female Academy Boarding House; thence running North about 63 degrees West in same course of said north line of the street aforesaid, about 24 rods and 4 links to a stake and stone about two feet northerly of a birch tree marked R; thence South 43 ½ degrees West about 15 rods to the north end of the west line of Willow Street, said road to be 40 feet wide, and on the southerly and easterly side of the lines aforesaid, due notice was given as required by the City Ordinance of the laying out aforesaid.

Said road crosses land occupied by Daniel Williams six rods and three links, and land of L. W. Lithgow and others. It is understood that no damages are claimed by S. W. Lithgow and others for their land taken for said road, and none are awarded by us, and if we have appraised the damages to be paid to the owner of the land taken for said road occupied by Daniel Williams at the sum of twenty-five dollars.

The following order was passed June 24, 1865

See Jr. Bd. of Ald., Vol. 3

ORDERED, That the street commencing at the junction of Myrtle and Willow Streets east of the river and running northerly and easterly to Bangor Street shall be deemed to be and known by the name of Willow Street. Same being a continuation of Willow Street. And that the street leading northerly from said street past the dwellings of George W. Quimby and others to its junction with Dam Street shall be known and called hereafter by the name of Maple Street.

Alderman Doe from the Committee on New Streets to which was referred the petition of E. K. Robinson and others, made the following report. That in conformity with a notice posted upon the 27th day of June 1850, in two public places in the City in the vicinity of said proposed street of the intention of the City Council to layout the same on the 6th day of July at 8 o'clock a.m. at the house of E. K. Robinson in said City. Your Committee assembled at the time and place mentioned in said notice and proceeded to locate said street and laid out the same as follows, viz:

Beginning at a stone bound on the west side of Bangor Street one hundred feet at right angles south from L. Farrington's land, thence North 65 West three hundred sixty-nine feet to a bound on a line coinciding with the east line of E. K. Robinson's land on which his home stands and as his fence is built said street to be forty feet wide and south of the above line; thence on the south line of the tract of land and on the north side of the lot now occupied by William Woart at a stone bound on a line coinciding with the east line of E. K. Robinson's land as now fenced; thence North 25 East eight hundred and eighty-three feet to the brow of the ravine to a stone bound set up: said street to be forty feet wide and east of the above lines. Damages claimed by Lithgow and others. We report damages.

The report was Read, Accepted and Sent Down for Concurrence.

Beginning at a point on Willow Street on or near the carriage shop of Hiram Clark and Company on the east side of the Kennebec River in said Augusta and extending northerly on a line east of and parallel with the Maine Central Railroad track to a point on Willow Street near the mill of Bangs Brothers.

And pray that their request may be granted.

The above petition was read and referred to the Committee on New Streets, and order of notice directed. Sent down for concurrence. It subsequently came back from the Common Council read and referred and order of notice directed in concurrence.

In pursuance of the above action on the City Council the following notice was issued:

WHEREAS, application is made to the City Council of said Augusta to layout a new street in said City, to wit:

A street leading northerly from a point at or near the carriage shop of Hiram Clark and Company on Willow Street on the east side of the Kennebec River in said Augusta which is its southern terminus, to a point on Willow Street near the Mill of Bangs Brothers which is its northern terminus, and

WHEREAS, said City Council has directed an order of notice upon such application.

All persons interested are therefore notified of the intention of the City Council to layout said street, and are hereby further notified to appear before the Joint Committee of the City Council on New Streets, being a Committee of the City Council having the matter in charge, at or near said carriage shop of said Hiram Clark and Company, on Wednesday the 17th day of October, 1894 at 3 o'clock in the afternoon, at which time and place a hearing relative to the proposed laying out of said street will be had.
